Church News

You will know that for the last two years Glenmoriston Congregation has been unable to sustain its required one-tenth of the cost of the ministry which it shares with Urquhart whose share is nine-tenths.

In the Spring of 1990 the Convener of the Presbytery Ministry Committee met with the Glenmoriston office bearers to discuss the matter.

And again, in Spring of 1991 Conveners of both Presbytery Ministry and Stewardship and Finance met the office bearers. As a result of that meeting and the efforts of the respective Conveners over the two years the 1990 and 1991 deficits of over £1,000 and £500 were cancelled by the National Committees. These meetings were followed by several informal ones between the office bearers from Glenmoriston and Urquhart and the Presbytery Parish Re-appraisal Committee to whom the Glenmoriston situation had been remitted. Finally, a draft basis of union was formulated and officially agreed upon by the office bearers and congregations concerned.

At its May 1992 meeting the Presbytery voted 33 to 3 for the basis of union, with Thursday, 27th August, 1992, as the projected date for the Service of Union which would be conducted by the Presbytery.

All this must await, however, the approval of the National Committee. Approval would mean the place of worship for the United Parish is Urquhart Church of Scotland in Drumnadrochit. However, services would continue on a monthly basis (first Sunday of the month) at Dulchriechard School at 3pm as usual.

Urquhart and Glenmoriston were disjoined in about 1893. Now, just about a century later they are on the edge of being re-united, to be known, as before, as the Parish of Urquhart and Glenmoriston.

INVERGARRY FOOTBALL TEAM



Invermoriston School


I feel happy and sad. Happy because it's nearly the holidays and sad because this school is closing for ever. I am going to Dulchreichard and so is my sister Hollie.



Invermoriston School

The end of this school session, a point which normally might be seen as yet another milestone in the lives of it's pupils, sadly brings Invermoriston school to the end of the road.

A proposal to close the school some years ago (See next page) was successfully warded off thanks to a vigorous protest from parents, former pupils and the community, but the constant low number of children on the roll made it inevitable that some rationalisation of educational provision should again be reviewed by the Educational Authority for educational as well as financial reasons.

The main school building has existed for about 120 years, and in the course of that time has undergone a few changes. The original entrance was at the front of the building, but this was converted to a store-room when an extension was added to provide an extra classroom, kitchen, cloakroom and toilets. The additional classroom doubled as a dining/general purpose room and latterly was also used as an office to accommodate the evergrowing demands of modern technology. The main classroom must have looked quite differnt in the days when heating was provided by a fire, and desks were uniformly arranged in tiers.


One or two relics of these earlier years remained in the school until recently but have now been taken for safe-keeping to the Education Office; among these are the large wall clock, the school hand-bell and the old Log Books.

It was sad to see the dispersal of all the school's resources which had been built up steadily over the years, thanks in somepart to the past generosity of parents and friends, but it is comforting to know that these resources have gone to the two neighbouring schools of Dulchreichard and Fort Augustus with whom Invermoriston has enjoyed close collaboration and friendship for many years, and to which Invermoriston children will now go.

Perhaps it is worth recalling that it <u>has</u> been known for Highland Schools, including Dulchreichard, to be reopened some years after closure, and there must be many people who hope that history will repeat itself at this end of the Glen.

Moriston Matters started back in 1977 under the "conventional, dull and ordinary" (their words not mine), name of Glenmoriston News and Views. Three issues carried that name until December 1977 when number 4 was printed under the new name of 'Moriston Matters'. A competition had been held for someone to come up with a new name and these were the suggestions;

"The Moristonian". "The Moriston Mail", "The Moristonian Mag". "The Moristonian Medley", "Moriston Muse". "Moriston Mixture", "Moriston Matters", "The Glenmoriston Gazette". "The Glenmoriston Tittle-Tattler "Glenmoriston Gossip". "Glenmoriston Gas". "Glenmoriston Gleanings", "Gleannings of the Glen", "Glenmoriston Gatherings". "Glen Glimpses", and "Glen Gen".

Moriston Matters was subsequently chosen having been put forward by Mrs Grant, Dundreggan. It was short and snappy yet comprehensive and embracing the aims and purposes of the magazine. And so the task was: To publish (Glen) moriston matters (chatter, natter, patter and the more serious) in order to publicise the well known fact that (Glen) moriston matters.

The masthead on the front cover was introduced in August 1978 in the 8th edition. The original idea came from Shona Robertson, Riverside Park and the actual drawing was done by Mike Tomlin formerly of Redburn.
