#### Church News

With the coming of Autumn: Harvest, Guy Fawkes, and Remembrance, I am reminded of what happened to an English friend of ours who worked in Japan some years ago. He lived in a less populated part of Tokyo with his wife and four children. It was Guy Fawkes Day and he thought it would be nice to celebrate the occasion with a bonfire. So, towards dusk he gathered up bits and pieces and set them alight making a good blaze which the family stood round to enjoy.

As they stood there, however, they were mildly aware of a growing commotion in the street leading up to their place. Eventually they realised they were encircled, at a distance, by fire engines and helmeted firemen. The fire-chief made his way towards them and their Guy Fawkes fire. Our friend discovered that he had done the unthinkable in Japan: He had lit a fire outside without permission. So he was hauled off to the police station to explain. What he regarded as an innocent custom was by Japanese law, in effect, a crime. After a couple of hours he was admonished and released.

In the same way, what we regard as 'natural' - like thinking covetous, hateful, selfish, immoral thoughts -God considers a crime. Jesus said that thinking these things was the same as doing them! God won't let us off as easily as the police did our friend. He regards us as criminal offenders, guilty before His bar of justice with a death sentence hanging over our heads. But strangely and wonderfully and mysteriously our God is also a God of the most winsome and just love you could possibly imagine. He sent Jesus Christ, His only Son, to take our place on the cross and bear the death sentence for us. He raised Him from death to endorse what He accomplished on the cross. Our part is to accept Him and what He has done for us. Even then, He doesn't simply release us to do our own thing, but to love and serve Him as part of His family.

Worship services are held in Dulchreichard School, 3pm the first Sunday of each month. Starting November 7th, Sunday School will be held concurrently with worship in the school. So plan to come and bring the children. Regular services are held in Drumnadrochit each Sunday at 10.30am and 6pm. You are most welcome.

There will be a brief service at the WAR MEMORIAL in Glenmoriston on Remembrance Sunday, 14th November at 10.55am, led by the Rev. J. Selfridge, retired minister from Inverness. That will be followed by a short service of worship in the Residents Lounge of the Glenmoriston Arms Hotel.

#### Loch Ness Gun Club

1993 has been a particularly busy year for the committee of Loch Ness Gun Club. We have had no fewer than twelve shoots this year including the DTL Home International and the British DTL Championship. These two events were held on the 9th and 10th of July repectively and attracted shooters from Scotland, England, Ireland and Wales.

The International is a team event with 40 shooters from each of the home countries (30 seniors, 5 ladies and 5 juniors). The seniors was won by Ireland with England as runners-up. The ladies was won by England with Scotland second. The juniors was won by a strong England team with Scotland a well deserved second only 12 points behind. My sister Ann-Marie was captain this year of the juniors which is her last year. The British Open attracted 300 shooters which was the limit the gun club could cope with.

The two events ran very smoothly with the help of locals to make it a shoot that will be remembered by shooters and spectators alike for a long time to come. The committee have all worked very hard this year and must be thanked for their commitment and the work they have done to make this one of the finest grounds in Britain.

I myself have had a very successful year. In May I won the juniors at the Scottish OT Grand Prix. On the 5th and 6th of June I travelled to Bywell which is near Newcastle to compete at the British ABT Grand Prix. I managed to win a gold medal and become British ABT Junior Champion. At the end of August I shot 97/100 at the Scottish ABT Championship to add the Scottish Junior title to my British title. I have also represented Scotland in the juniors at ABT. This event was held on the 8th of October in Cheddar Valley near Bristol (573 miles from Achlain!). Along with my team-mate Russell Marello we managed to lift the International title for Scotland. This year is particularly special for me as I now hold all three titles in the one year.

I would like to thank my main sponsors Mum and Dad and the various other people who have helped me financially throughout the year.

## St Andrews Visit

At the end of July, Audrey Kemp and myself set off, full of happy anticipation for St. Andrews. We had booked a holiday at the University, taking an art course. The course we had chosen was called "Creative Responses", chosen because the brochure described it as needing no artistic skills, but a willingness to experiment - ideal for a couple of 'non-artists'.

We were to board at McIntosh Hall, one of the University Halls of Residence. We each had a pleasant room to ourselves. I had a large window with a deep windowsill on which I spent a good deal of time sitting and looking out to the sea and the sky, the sands and the golf course. Just along the corridor was a small kitchen where you could make your own cuppa (all ingredients supplied). All our meals were provided in the dining hall and very good they were too.

We both enjoyed the course very much. The tutor was encouraging and helpful to everyone. There were twelve of us, all with varying degrees of skill, but all eager to develop and stretch ourselves further. It was not a course intended to instil in us any set techniques, or to produce any conventional realistic pictures, rather it was to draw on our own latent creative talent by stimulating us to view things from different angles. To which end we manipulated our oil pastels to music, drew things without looking at the paper, drew things with our 'unusual' hand, considered shapes of shadows and highlights rather than the object, and looked at overall form rather than the detail. The results of all this covered every available space in the art room with an immense variety of pictures and a wealth of colour by the end of the week. It was intriguing how twelve people would start with the same image and develop it into something totally different from each other. I found it a most stimulating week and came home full of enthusiasm. However, whilst still enthusiastic, I must own up to not having produced one masterpiece since I got back. Somehow there's always something to be done in the garden.

It was the first time I'd been to St. Andrews and I was enchanted by the town. At first glance all grey stone buildings, but on close inspection each one having it's own distinctive architectural feature, from the smallest house to the grandest building. I loved the courtyards and gardens and quadrangles that lurked almost unseen until you ventured through a stone arch or ornate ironwork gate. I loved the magnificent array of chimneypots sported by every building in town. I loved that incredibly long sandy beach. In fact, I loved St. Andrews.

#### **Obituaries**

LESLIE WARD came from London to live in Glenmoriston in a state of semi-retirement with his wife, Winnifred, 32 years ago. From then until quite recently he was still actively practising, helping and advising both locals and those further afield with their accounts. He lost his devoted wife back in 1981 but he kept himself occupied with his work and his passion for boats and model railways. His expertise will be sadly missed.

June 12th 1993 saw the deaths of two nonagenarians - two ladies who for much of their long lives had been part of the Glen community.

MRS G.E.M. GRANT - Mrs John as she was affectionately known in the Glen - died aged ninety in a residential home near Nairn where she had lived happily for the past few years. She came to the Glen when her husband, Mr John Grant, took over as factor of Glenmoriston Estates in the early fifties. She immediately showed her interest in the community and put her many talents at it's disposal. Her interest in drama led her to produce a series of tableaux showing local history and she became president of Glenmoriston W.R.I. where she was always willing to pass on her skills in cooking and all kinds of needlework, and in the wider sphere of the Federation she played a full part. She was responsible for the making of curtains for the draughty hall door and half a dozen or so women gathered in her house on several afternoons when the tonques flew as fast as the needles as the curtains were stitched under her knowledgeable direction. The warmth of her friendship and the encouragement of her smile drew people to her. But probably she would like to be remembered best as a homemaker, for she ably supported her husband in his duties and allowed nothing to stand in the way of a happy family holiday for Ian and Peter when they came home from school at the end of term. She left the Glen for Drumnadrochit when Mr John retired but retained a lively interest in the people and was always glad to see the issues of Moriston matters.

MRS JEAN MacTAVISH came to Balintombuie during the war to the house her husband had built where his forebearers had been crofters. She settled happily into the community and her home quickly became a haven for friendship and hospitality among the hills. She was a nurse by profession and her caring nature showed itself in the ease with which she related to young and old alike. It was a source of great satisfaction to her that her two daughters and two granddaughters followed in her footsteps. She was always young in heart and when latterly her home was in Inverness the grandchildren could always be found with her if they had time off from school or work. She was even known in her nineties to watch a football match on TV although she was 'not really interested' so that she would be able to talk knowledgeably about it when she met one of the younger members of the family later in the day.



## Jaws gets Hooked

A shark hooked in the Pentland Firth earlier this year has been confirmed as a world record.

The 507 lb porbeagle was landed by Chris Bennett from Bunloin, Glenmoriston after an epic two hour struggle off Dunnet Head. He hooked the fish - a sharp-toothed relative of the Great White shark - while out with local skipper Clair Calder on his boat, Karen, back in March. Chris, who runs a venison marketing business, was delighted with his catch. It has already been accepted as the biggest fish caught by rod and line in Scottish waters and it now goes into the record books as the world's biggest probeagle caught using any tackle. It easily beats the previous biggest specimen - a 465-pounder caught off Cornwall in 1977.

Burgess and Duncan MacGillivray, Lindsay Weir and Jock Fraser, 1992 Mod gold medallist George Gunn and Coronach. The children thoroughly enjoyed their recording debut and were treated to a party courtesy of M & S afterwards. The tape, CD or cassette, is available from Balnain House in Inverness.


