#### Obituaries

MRS CATHY MACDONALD died at her home in Achnaconeran after a long illness only six months after her husband Donald. She lived most of her life there, where she brought up her family in the good old tradition of highland hospitality. Achnaconeran may seem a remote little community but many people found their way there over the years and she will be sadly missed by many friends.

THE REV. PETER FRASER M.A. B.D. died peacefully at his home in Kiltarlity in his 80th year. He was parish minister in Glenmoriston from 1949 till he retired in 1979. After his retirement he continued to take an active interest in Glenmoriston matters.

He was educated in Culburnie, Beauly and Inverness Royal Academy and after graduating from Edinburgh University ministered in Edinburgh and in Ghana before coming to Glenmoriston where he presided over a very busy and rapidly changing community.

In the early 50s he became County Councillor for Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston where he took a special interest in education. On the reorganisation of local government he joined the District Council where his remit was Housing. After retiring to his native Kiltarlity he took over as district councillor for Kiltarlity and Kirkhill.

The Reverend Peter, as he was popularly known, served the people of Glenmoriston and the surrounding area for more than thirty years, not only as parish minister and councillor but as a good friend, counsellor and comforter to all. His many friends will commiserate with Mrs. Fraser, Helen and William. He will be sadly missed.

# TV Club

Early December saw strange happenings around Dalchreichart as the TV Club's new Receiving and Re-transmission equipment was installed. Part of the scheme was for members to have new aerials and their TV equipment tuned to the new channel frequencies that were to be used.

It was a difficult exercise to co-ordinate and members were very accommodating in assisting the Aerial Scan staff to complete the installation.

The results show a great improvement of picture quality on all four channels. There is however one ongoing problem of interference. It is not quite as bad as the worst level of before but when it occurs it is naturally irritating to the members who have invested a hundred pounds each for the new system.

The interference problem requires the source to be identified and then corrective action to be taken. The atrocious weather we have had since the installation has prevented the tracking down of the interference source. This will be done as soon as we have favourable weather conditions. The action to remove the interference can then be taken.

An extract from Peter Fraser's farewell article for the magazine No. 19 June 1980 after his retiral.

The following was part of a tribute paid by J.D. Michael, Glenurquhart which appeared in magazine No. 18 April 1980.

#### REV. PETER FRASER, M.A., B.D.

Fanellan, Culburnie, Beauly, Inverness, Edinburgh reads almost like a fairy tale. A contemporary at school described him as a guileless lad, who never quarrelled and tried to see the good in everyone. A remarkable tribute. He had a habit of being kind to those, for whom Christ died, who were less fortunate than others in society; one of the reasons he befriended Africans who were not as acceptable as some in Edinburgh in the thirties. Glenmoriston in 1949, when Peter and Margaret with William and Helen (James was to join the family the following year) arrived there, was in the throes of both Hydro-electric and Forestry development and Peter was not only Parish minister, but chaplain to the work force - over 800 - under the Rev. John MacIntyre, the first Industrial Chaplain appointed by the Church of Scotland. Peter as resident in the Glen was instrumental in such integration as was possible between the Glen and the workers. Engineers now scattered all over the world, who had worked on the Cluanie and Loyne Dams, the Dundreggan Dam or the Levishie scheme, still ask about the Rev. Peter. He was the friend of all - A true and faithful servant of his master.

Let them hear your sabre rattle, For place in fame.


'tis true despite your shrivelled skin, When peeled you are pure gold within, And worthy to be kith and kin, To finest fare.

EMBARASSING MOMENTS






