Tribute to Mrs Fraser

It was with very great sadness that we learnt of Margaret Fraser's death, just months after she lost her husband, Peter. She was one of the instigators of "Moriston Matters" and was, for years, its chief reporter. In fact that the magazine actually came into being is entirely due to Mrs Fraser - it was her idea, to start a community newsletter of some sort. That it survived and thrived was due to her enthusiasm, her driving force and her industry. Her tireless newsgathering ensured each copy was full of interesting articles and up-to-the-minute stories. The fact that the magazine was published every two months instead of every quarter makes her effort even more outstanding.

It wasn't just the magazine that she was involved in. There was hardly a social event or gathering that she didnt attend or have some part in its organisation. She was president of the S.W.R.I for 13 year having been Vice-president for several years and secretary for 3 years previous to that, after which she became Secretary again. She regularly attended conferences in Edinburgh spending countless hours and travelling many miles on representing and organising the group's interests. She was also an active member of the women's guild. She taught many of the school childen to enjoy one of her most favourite pastimes, Scottish Country Dancing. I met her only last year at a dance in Beauly and she was still enjoying every minute of it.

When she and her husband, the Rev. Peter Fraser, left the Glen in 1980, it lost one of its most helpful and encouraging members. She was a pillar of society and an integral part of the backbone of the glen. She will be very sorely missed by all who knew her - She was one in a million.



Community Council

At the last two meetings of the Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Council held in Kilchuimen Academy on Thursday 26th May and Dulchreichard School on 30th June the main points of interest were-:

- a) Work on the new car park has been deferred till Spring 1995.
- b) Mr R. Murchison is to investigate possible improvements to Columba's Well.
- c) Invermoriston Playing Field The District Council wished to acquire this ground but Glenmoriston Estate was unwilling to sell. The field was well used by the community and it was felt that it should continue to be available.
- d) Dulchreichard Notice board Allan Common has been asked to paint and tidy the board up.
- e) Street cleaning Invermoriston Mr MacKenzie (Regional Councillor) is to take up this matter.
- f) Council to be approached with the suggestion that some work might be carried out on the access to Dalchreichart Cemetery while contractors were on site in the area.
- g) The Chairman was to investigate the attention required by the footpath at Invermoriston and the problem of large puddles at the Hall and toilet areas.
- h) Many residents of the Torgoyle/Dulchreichard Road expressed their wish to have a speed limit imposed on this road and a petition was presented to the Community Council stating their reasons for this. The petition is to be sent to Highland Regional Council Dept. of Roads and Transport and a request is also to be made for temporary improvements at the junction of the A887 and for a No Through Road sign to be erected.

Copies of the full minutes are on display in both Fort Augustus and Invermoriston Post Offices. The next and last meeting of the present Community Council is on Thursday 25th September at 7.30pm in Kilchuimen Academy, Fort Augustus and a warm welcome is extended to everyone.

PRIMARY SCHOOL FOOTBALL 1993/1994

Just before the end of 1993 a coaching night was set up in Fort Augustus school. The coaching was aimed at kids from 5 - 12 years and was run by Duncan MacCormack and assisted by Dave McEwan. Both Duncan and Dave had attended an S.F.A. 'D' Development course in football coaching in November 1993. The nights involve all sorts of skills and routines which are not just for boys. We have a couple of girls participating fairly regularly. The Friday sessions have been very well attended each week with over 20 turning up. Generally we start around 5.30pm and end just after 7.00pm. We have managed to enter the kids in a competition in Fort William along with playing a couple of games against Lochyside and Banavie schools. The tournament was a great occasion for the kids and although they didn't win the tournament they did give a good account of themselves. The game against Lochyside ended in a penalty shootout after a 4-4 draw (Lochyside won 4-3). The game against Banavie ended in a 7-6 defeat. The games are good for the kids in terms of trying out what has been taught them. The final scores are irrelevant although some players do take things a bit seriously.

To raise funds we held a sponsored 'keepie-up' which was overseen by ex-professional Ross Jack who is the new development officer for the Highlands replacing Eric Black of ex Aberdeen fame. The children performed wonders and have raised probably 250 - 300. Any kids wishing to attend, come along on Friday 25th August. D. McEwan.
