On the 27th January 11 year old Caroline Kennedy from Dundreggan Farm was horrifically injured in a road accident after stepping off the school bus at the farm's road end. She suffered two broken legs, head injuries and other cuts and bruises. Thanks to the quick thinking and expertise of a passer-by her life was saved. She spent two weeks in intensive care with one leg in traction. Gradually her power of speech returned and she was transferred to the Rowan ward. After a great deal of pain, sweat, tears and hard work she is now walking with the aid of crutches. It's almost like learning to walk all over again. If she continues to make such good progress then hopefully it won't be long before she can come home. Caroline is pictured below with "ROWAN", the collie pup named after the children's ward, who has been helping to raise funds for the ward at the hospital.



Caroline has been in hospital since January because she had a very bad leg injury. It was so bad that two bones in her leg were broken. But now it is much better and she's in a wheelchair. She can stand up and walk without anything. She really has almost recovered. We're really looking forward for her coming back to school.

Memories of the Glen

Last year my husband and I spent a memorable week with Matthew and Ann Douglas at Dalcattaig. This reminded me of something I wrote for "Moriston Matters" in 1978. I think it might still be of interest in 1995.

Dalcattaig Road. There I had my first lessons in botany from my mother and my Aunt Jenny.

Dalcattaig Road was a veritable treasure trove of botanical lore, which I have never forgotten.

My ten-year old imagination was disgusted by the 'behavior' of the Common Butterwort (PINGUICULA VULGARIS), which looked like a beautiful pale green star-fish, but it could literally eat insects by rolling its leaves inwards. The flowers of this plant resembled fragile delicate violets.


Almost as repulsive to me was Sundew (DROSERA ROTUNDIFOLIA) with its rosette of stalked yellowish green leaves, covered with sticky red hairs. These very hairs were capable of turning inwards to trap and 'digest' unsuspecting insects.

But Dalcattaig Road was not all violence. In a corner of "Johnnie's Field" (Bridge-end) grew the beautiful Butterfly Orchid (PLATANTHERA BIFOLIA). I wonder if he could create the haunting perfume of the lime blossoms (TILIA EUROPAEA) on a damp August evening - well, not the

On this wonderful road grew the most delicious early brambles. We called them "pointers" because the first ones grew and ripened on the end of the stem. Near

Wester Dalcattaig grew a large Bird Cherry tree (PRUNUS PADUS). In our young minds this tree was unique! It's black pea-sized fruits were not nearly as bitter as the usual Bird Cherry fruits. My aunt, my sisters and I made a special pilgrimage each year to sample these delights.

At the end of February an extraordinary General meeting was held in Glenmoriston Arms Hotel to discuss the future (if it actually has one) of the village hall. Twenty four people responded to the plea-for-help letter that was circulated round the Glen and a new committee was formed.

All the people present agreed that -

- a) there was absolutely no point whatsoever in trying to rejuvenate or reinstate the existing hall.
- b) The suggestion to use Invermoriston school was abandoned due to the cost of making it suitable for all activities. In addition the grants required to assist refurbishment would be unavailable.
- c) The best course of action was to build a new replacement hall which catered for all the communities needs. The terms and conditions of the feu for the present hall site are being reviewed in an initial step towards a replacement building.

At present the hall fund stands at £16560.47. This healthy balance is mainly due to the efforts of all who have helped at previous gala days and other fundraising activities. Hopefully this momentum can be kept alive and kicking.

Church News

At the beginning of March the Rev. Bart Buell bid a fond farewell to the Glen when he held his final service of worship at Dulchreichard School. The tiny schoolroom was packed and the congregation were treated to a lovely spread of tea, sandwiches and cakes afterwards.

Rev. Buell and his wife, Margaret, moved to Drumnadrochit 15 years ago from Edinburgh. At that time the late Rev. Peter Fraser had just retired and left the Glen to live in Kiltarlity and the Glenmoriston Church was to be linked with Urquhart parish.

The following is an extract taken from a report of the Service of Linkage which appeared in the June 1980 edition of the magazine.........

"On Tuesday 27th May the service of Linkage, Ordination and Induction took place at Kilmore Church, Urquhart, when a large representation from Glenmoriston were present at this special occasion. The Linkage was a historic and somewhat sad occasion for Glenmoriston as it meant that we were finally saying goodbye to the sole charge of the Rev. Peter Fraser, and joining with the congregation of Urquhart to form a new dual charge under the ministry of the Rev. Bart Buell. Following the ceremony of linkage, the ordination and induction of the Rev. Buell took place, conducted by the Moderator of the Inverness Presbytery, the Rev. Tom Swanston, and ministers and elders of the presbytery.

Perhaps the highlight of the evening was the robing of the Rev. Buell by Mrs Michael, an incident not without humour as she struggled to place the hood over the head of "the Gentle Giant". She eventually made it.

On Sunday 1st June a large congregation gathered in the church to hear the introductory service conducted by the Rev. James Philip of Edinburgh, in which he welcomed the Rev. Buell to the service of God in the parish of Glenmoriston and hoped that his stay would be a long and happy one. "

Retirement has overtaken us and that also means that 'flitting' has overtaken us as well. Most of you will know all about that: Where did we put that? and days later we find it in a box at the bottom of the pile. I'm afraid it's a bit like that with finding time to write something for the spring edition of Moriston Matters!

However may I say something about Easter and its meaning by telling a short anecdote. An avowed ?? unbeliever challenged a believer in Jesus Christ to a debate about the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. The unbeliever insisted that the debate take place in front of a large church congregation. The unbeliever had his say for about an hour setting out the reasons why the resurrection could not have happened. The believer was then given three (!) minutes to prove his point. He turned to the large congregation and said in a strong, clear, confident voice: "Christ is risen !" and the congregation replied as one man in a clear confident voice; "He is risen indeed!"

Could we reply like that and mean it ?

The worship services with Sunday School continue to be held in Dulchreichard Primary School the first Sunday of each month at 3pm. Weekly services are held in Drumnadrochit on Sundays at 10.30 am and 6.00 pm. Please come along. You are most welcome.

Last year Mike Allen from Dalcattaig completed his marathon walk along Britain's watershed from Land's End to Cape Wrath. (i.e. not crossing any natural running water)

The original intention was to complete the walk, which began at Easter 1988, within the first six months but Mike has been plagued by injury and hampered by lack of finance. 1994 was the toughest section - from Rannoch Moor to Cape Wrath, but at least it was home territory - for all the ups and downs, quite literally!

So fortunately transport assistance from his wife Margaret and others enabled the walk to be completed in short stints with lengthy breaks in between.

Reaching the Great Glen on May 27th was the first hurdle, enlivened by a surprise picnic laid on by the Robertsons! From there to Cluanie was sponsored in aid of the Village Hall: thanks to all sponsors even though it took most of June to finish - what with weather and other interruptions. Thereafter it was bits and bobs northwards via rendezvous near Achnasheen, Ullapool, Inchnadamph and Durness to reach Cape Wrath on 2nd October.

It's a remarkable walk including some remote country:

From Ben Alder Forest to Knoydart, where the watershed is only 2 miles from the West Coast. From Kintail to the Fannichs, where it was decided that future camping out was to be avoided: the curse of the midges!

From Beinn Dearg, near where a golden eagle soared away from within a few feet, to Ben More Assynt - catching a glorious day with the end in sight.

From Ben More across Sutherland wilderness via Foinaven to Cape Wrath.

Thank goodness there was plenty of time in 1994 to finish, because Highland weather can vary from the sublime to the ridiculous, and some of the ridiculous could be avoided! Even so there were some wet and windy days at high level, like traversing the South Cluanie ridge on June 27th with Margaret, but overall it's been quite an experience!!
