Local Success

Since resuming training in April, Steven Smith of Dalchreichart has gone from strength to strength in his amateur athletics. Steven competes in the under 15 age group to which the following results refer.

He travelled to the Kelvin Hall, Glasgow on 7th May and achieved a Gold Certificate for 1st place in the "Speed Bounce" event. He was representing the Inverness District in competition with other athletes from the Scottish Athletes Federation.

On May 14th he took part in the Scottish North District Championships, representing his club, the Inverness Harriers. At this event he was awarded two Gold Medals, for the Long Jump at 5.23m and for the 200m in 25.1 secs.

Also at Inverness for the Harriers on 28th May, he competed in a qualifying event for the McDonalds Young Athlete' League Competition (at which he ran in the finals at Birmingham last year). On this occasion he got three more firsts under his belt. In the long jump he leapt 5.23m. Another first for Steven in the 200m in 25.0 secs and another with his team in the 4 x 100m relay at 48.52 secs which is approximately 1 sec outside the Scottish record.

On June 3rd Steven gathered 3 more firsts at the North of Scotland Inter School Sports in competition with 50 other teams. He was awarded certificates for 1st places in the long jump at 5.93m and in the 200m (24.9secs) and, with his team, came first in the $4\times100m$ relay.

Travelling to Grangemouth on June 6th for the semi-finals of the North of Scotland Schools Athletics Association event, he continued his impressive winning form with firsts in the long jump at 5.51m and in the 100m in 12.0 secs. His age group for the 200m was cancelled, but competing instead with the under 17's, he ran his heat in 24.6 secs and came 2nd in the final in 24.7 secs.

Back to Grangemouth again on 17th June for the Scottish Schools Championships, Steven was awarded a Gold medal for 5.5im in the long jump and reached a joint 3rd in the 200m in 24.6 secs.

The Scottish Schools Inter Area Match (Finals) was held at Grangemouth on 21st June, where Steven again improved his personal best with a first in a time of 11.8 secs in the 100m and 1st again with his team in the 4x100m relay (48.5 secs). The results here go towards his points score for 1995.

At Glenurquhart School Steven was awarded the MacDonald Westfield Trophy, a certificate for acheivement in P.E., a certificate for being the over-14 boys cross-country champion and the Honour Shield for bringing honour to the school.

On Sunday 2nd July Steven took part in his first International event, against a team from Australia. He again showed them what he can do, with 1st place in the long jump against three Australians. (Who needs kangaroo's !!)

Steven's excellent results so far this year (including relay events), are: 1st - 15, 2nd - 1 and 3rd - 1, with nothing less than 3rd! This makes Steven the Scottish champion for under-15.

Keep up the good work !!

And a final note....Steven's school are going to have to extend their long jump pit so he doesn't jump right over it !!



The Old Manse at Invermoriston which lies above the now disused church is currently being used as a holiday home but the poor economic climate (and the dismal) ordinary climate) has brought about a drop in bookings for its owners. Mr and Mrs David Malin from Warwickshire, forcing them to put the house on the market.



Torqoyle Lodge, built at the turn of the century, is also up for grabs. The house was originally used as a shooting lodge for Glenmoriston Estates but for a period of time it was also a coaching Inn before being bought by the Hydro Electric Board and laterly by the Forestry Commission from which Malcolm and Catherine Grance obtained it.



Also on offer are the Free Church and Manse at Cul-na-Carn and Lochview Cottage. owned by the Cruickshanks but formerly lived in by Linda Nairn and her family.

AN UPDATE ON CAROLINE'S PROGRESS.

As was reported in the last issue of the magazine 11 year old Caroline Kennedy was involved in a major road accident that saw her spend several weeks in hospital. Since leaving the confines of the hospital bed. Caroline has been back attending school, albeit just for half a day. She still gets tired quite quickly and becomes very emotional when excited or upset. However, she is now a common sight on her bicycle, a mode of transport that she finds much easier and less tiring than walking.

She still has to make regular trips back to the hospital for routine checks to be made on her leq. When Caroline makes her next visit to the specialist in August he will hopefully be able to make the decision as to whether or not he will have to operate on the knee or not. In the meantime Caroline will still have to wear the special splint to keep her leg straight.

Caroline was in her final year at primary school but even though she was confined to hospital for so long she managed to keep up with her school work so that her progress on to secondary school is not going to be hindered. Come August 15th, all things being well, she will be on the bus and on her way to Fort Augustus Secondary School to start the next phase of her education.

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Save our Hall !!

Following the wishes expressed at the Special Meeting held in February, your present Committee has been looking into the preparation of plans for a new hall on the present site and confirming our eligibility for grants. Although the latter can never be quarenteed. Janet Graham, from the Dept. of Libraries and Leisure was able to assure us that the needs of the Community are sufficient to merit 75% of costs from HRC and the Scottish Office. A further 10% can be contributed by Inverness and Nairn Enterorise.

The main criterion we have to meet, in order to receive the grants is to have available our share of the money. Over the last five years, a chenominal effort has been made in such a small community to raise just over £14.000 - and a very big debt is owed to those committee members who spearheaded the campaign and to all of you who supported their efforts. Without that amount in the bank, we couldn't now begin to think about the next step: i.e. precise plans.

As the mathematicians among you will have noted, another £1.000 in our kitty would mean we could look at a building costing £100,000.

"Plenty! " you might think. However, to release public money, we have to fulfil certain conditions, one costly item being the employment of an Architect. who must have professional indemnity. Only recognised building firms may do the construction work; the original fitting out may be included in the grant, etc. Janet Graham recommended that we look at a high quality facility, possibly closer to the £200,000 limit. The balance between this and the length of time it might take to acheive, is something we don't as yet know the answer to. Until we can get exact costing. it seems reasonable to look at a figure half-way between: £150,000 (of which our share would be £22,500)

To help us towards the extra thousands, we are holding some local events this year and also applying to the Millennium Fund. Unfortunately, we have not been able to organise a Gala this year but would be willing to support any individual or group who felt they would like to have some big (or small !) event later in the summer.

The May plant stalls raised £241.45 and we should like to thank the SWRI for their magnificent support and all who donated plants and cakes.

The V.E. barbeoue at the Tavern raised £38.50. Our thanks go to Alan Draper, who made things very simple for us. by setting up the stall and providing all ingredients at cost price. Something similar is planned for the week in which V.J. day falls (12th -19th August)

Our next event is the Car Boot sale on July 22nd, when you can not only make a profit out of your unwanted posessions but also make it a no-cookino day by eating out at our excellent barbeque.


