
### Dulchreichard School

# What's in a Map Reference

The 1:25,000 Ordnance Survey map of Invermoriston currently available claims to have been compiled from surveys between 1967 and 1974, and revised for selected changes in 1978; an older one I have of Glenmoriston is compiled from surveys dated 1965-67, and revised for significant changes in 1977. One wonders what selected and significant mean! Some of the features shown on these maps are intriguing. Let us take a short trip around and look at them. Invermoriston village first.

We start at the old pier shown on the map. There is certainly not much of it left now; what boats called in and what cargo and passengers did they bring? Was it in use in 1978?

Just north of the pier and on the same side of the road the map shows "Pol Sta", possibly on the site of Pier Cottage, a little south of Tigh Na Bruach. In the absence of further information in the conventional signs section of the map, I assume that "Pol Sta" is a Police Station. If so, was it in operation in 1978, or did the cartographers consider a change of use not worth "selecting"?

On the opposite side ( west ) of the road, slightly nearer to Invermoriston, was a garage; was this a motor repair shop, a petrol filling station, or what? And a little further north on the same side sheep were apparently washed!

Moving towards the village, St. Columba's well ( did he visit Invermoriston after he saw off the monster ? ) is marked on the map but it is not clear exactly where it is sited - perhaps in the old graveyard ?

Dundreggan dam was almost certainly built by then, but the river shown on the map looks wide and deep, and waterfalls cascade some way below the bridge.

# What's in a Map Reference

Continuing to the junction (A82 / A887) and turning right towards Inverness, a little way past the hotel there are obvious remains of a petrol filling station on the right of the road; this the map ignores. Further on, on the north side of the road between Invermoriston House and Home farm and possibly where Guisaichean Guest House now is, there apparently were kennels; were these boarding kennels or breeding kennels? The milestone beyond Pole Cottage is still standing but like the one at the junction the lettering cannot be read.

Retracing our steps and taking the road to Skye we find the hotel, church, Post Office, school and Riverside Park all shown. Sadly, both the school and the church no longer fulfil their original purposes, the last service in the latter being held on Sunday, 23rd August, 1992 and the school being closed in the summer of the same year. When did the Post Office move to its present location?

Moving up the glen from Invermoriston, we note that the milestone indicated near Levishie has disappeared. Further on, the Glenmoriston map indicates a footbridge across the river about a mile below the dam; what was this built for, and how long ago was it still in use?


Travelling towards Torgoyle it seems not much has changed. The footprints cairn is shown on the map ( do they remain a tourist attraction now they've been vandalised?) The Post Office at Dalchreichart is also shown, but since the revision was in 1977 and the Post Office only closed in 1978 we'll forgive the mapmakers! However, at that time, as confirmed in Moriston Matters of April, 1991, the PO at Inchmore was no more - but it is clearly marked; another insignificant change?

If any residents have memories of any of the above, I should be pleased to hear from them.
