Church News

One of the features of the city minister's life which tends to differ from that of the country minister relates to funerals. Not the style of funeral, not even the length of the funeral - but the number of funerals. Indeed, city ministers often gauge how busy they are by the number of funerals they have in a year. One of my colleagues in the East End of Glasgow averages 3 funerals per week.

All that being said - and given the smaller population in the country - you would expect that the country minister would be, therefore, less busy! But a few weeks ago I was involved in funerals, one week, on the Monday, the Tuesday and the Wednesday. Yesterday I had two funerals in the one day.

Now, I write this, not to gain sympathy, neither to let you know that the minister actually does something from Monday to Saturday, on the contrary, I write on this topic because I have been led to think, over these last few weeks, about death.

If one thing is certain, it is this - we shall all die. Whether we be rich or poor, well clothed or naked, whether we live in mansions or in the open air - this is the common lot of human beings - to give up our mortal bodies.

How do you feel about that? Are you comfortable with death? Is it something to which you have given much thought? Is it something you have spoken about with your friends - or even your spouse? Or is this the one taboo subject? If you are reticent about raising this subject, why so? Surely this, being the one thing which unite humans, should be the one thing about which we should talk?

I suspect that the reason for our reluctance lies in the uncertainty of what lies beyond. The fear of unknown dangers is one thing - but the fear of the unknown can be too much to contemplate. You might be surprised to learn that, in the Church, we are quite happy to speak about death and what lies beyond. This holds no fears for the Christian - he will speak about this with anyone. In fact, he actually, even though he be fit and strong and active, is looking forward to death - not because he is morbid, but because he has been introduced to God in this life and looks forward to getting to know Him better in the next.

Don't you want to find out a little more about life beyond this life? Wouldn't it allay some of your fears? Why not come along and see?

We have services at 10.30 am and 6 pm every Sunday in Drumnadrochit and on the first Sunday of every month in Dulchreichard School at 3 pm.

Glenmoriston Arms Hotel

The major refurbishment of the Glenmoriston Arms Hotel was completed last week. Flash floods last August caused extensive damage to the buildings and grounds, but the repairs set in hand by Neil and Carol Scott have restored things to their former glory.

Four hours of torrential rain put them through a horrendous experience. A burn in the garden filled up with stones washed down from a nearby hillside and the water got diverted right through the hotel. The Tavern & Bistro and kitchens plus other parts of the hotel were flooded causing widespread damage. Two bridges in the grounds were washed away and the gardens devastated. In addition to the repairs to the main buildings it was necessary to reline the walls and base of the burn, demolish and replace damaged chalet-type buildings, reinstate a paved patio and fencing, and replant lawns and shrubs.

With all the work going on around them the past three months have been something of a nightmare but it's all behind them now as they look forward to a new season.

Vickie has Toto, the pony currently on loan, and Casey to ride, so both girls will be busy. We are hoping for some good results to get us off to a flying start.

However our thoughts continue to drift back to Sammy and the amazing start to the season he had last year before he tragically died. In his memory we are presenting a lovely Border Fine Arts trophy of a Palomino pony at the BHS show in Inverness in May where Sammy was champion last year. What a glorious start it would be if we could win that trophy this year !!

Glenmoriston Village Hall 1929

"A Public Meeting of the people of Invermoriston was held in the school on Thursday 11th August 1927 at 9pm to consider the advisability of steps being taken to raise funds for the erection of a public hall in Invermoriston to take the place of the Comrades Hall recently destroyed".

With these historic words the Hall Minute Book 1927-1947 records the setting into motion of the process which would lead to the erection of the present Glenmoriston Public Hall. And set into motion too were the local dignitaries in whose civic hands the project was entrusted. They were:-

Captain Grant of Glenmoriston (Chairman)

Mrs Grant of Glenmoriston Mr & Mrs Kydd, The Hotel

Mrs A.D. Grant, Craigian

Mr W. Chisholm, The Shop

Mr D. MacDonald, The Pier

Mr J. McEwan, Forestry Hut

Mr Pollock, Schoolhouse

Rev. A. MacNeill and

Mr A.D. Grant, Estate Office (Secretary & Treasurer)

Fund-raising was, of course, of paramount importance. As a first step, each member of the "Ways and Means" Committee, as it was called, set himself or herself to "endeavour" to raise £10 from among his or her friends, none to be collected locally. An "Entertainments" sub-committee, consisting of Mr Chisholm, Mrs Kydd and Mrs Grant, Craigian, under the chairmanship of Mr McEwan, was formed to organise a dance. (This was held in the hall at Invermoriston Mains on Friday 26th August 1927, and realised the sum of £20 and 13 shillings) And then, in this preliminary stage of fund-raising, the Territorial Force Association, the National Council of Social Service and the Forestry Commission were approached for financial assistance, it being pointed out to them that the erection of a Public Hall in Invermoriston "would tend to improve the social life of the district". The first two bodies named declined to assist; whether or not the Forestry Commission did is not clear.

About the same time a "building" or "works" sub-committee was formed comprising - Mr Kydd, Mr Chisholm, Mr D. MacDonald and the Chairman and Secretary as ex-officio members. By the 17th September 1927, a plan 'B' was adopted as a suitable type of building, at an estimated cost of between £340 and £400. Following what must have been lengthy discussion and negotiation, the contract for the erection of the Hall, the building to be of the "expanded metal type", was awarded to Mr. Norman Smart of Inverness.

Meantime fund-raising was being continued apace. The possibilty of a Free Gift Sale was discussed, and it was decided to arrange a door-to-door collection. Lady Cooper of Ceannacroc was mooted as a likely subscriber and it was resolved to send a "suitable letter" to "Her Ladyship".

By December 10th 1927, a site had been selected and negotiated for, and the go ahead given to clear the site and prepare the foundations as soon as the "Building Committee" considered it safe to do cement and concrete work.

So far, the sum of £124 and 13 shillings had been collected and approximately £85 had been further promised and would be paid to the Hall Fund after the building operation had commenced. At this point, Captain Grant intimated that in the event of the necessary funds not being raised, Glenmoriston Estates Ltd., if approached, probably would be willing to contribute towards the fund.

By the 26th September 1928 the question of securing chairs and forms and installing lighting was being dealt with, and negotiations had been entered into with Mr J. Paterson, Fort Augustus, regarding the cost of putting in "lavatories".

A perennial problem, that of spiraling costs, now reared its head: in October 1928 it was found that even in spite of a donation of £150 from Glenmoriston Estates Ltd., a further £300 plus was required to complete the hall in a "moderate way".

But Sir Alexander Grant, Bart. of Logie, whose forebears came from Glenmoriston, had promised to contribute "whatever sum Captain Grant found was required to complete the hall and make it comfortable for future use", and accordingly he was asked for a donation of £400. Altogether it would seem that the erection of the Hall, its furnishings, lighting (by Petromax lamps), installation of water (hand-pumped from St. Columba's Well) and toilets cost about £600.

The Hall was officially opened on Friday 5th October 1928, the occasion of an opening ceremony and grand dance. It must have been a memorable evening as the extracts from the "Inverness Courier" testify.

Towards the close of that year, a draft constitution was deliberated on and after "several alterations thereto" had been effected, a fourteen clause Constitution of the Glenmoriston Public Hall was approved.

On the 15th December 1928, a caretaker at an "annual salary of Ten Pounds, payable in equal sums of Five Pounds each half year" was appointed. There had been six applicants, now reduced to a list of three; William MacDonald, Blacksmith; William MacKenzie, Invermoriston Pier and Donald MacDonald, Redpark. Donald MacDonald was appointed and took up his duties on the 17th December 1928.

A meeting of Householders elected as the Hall's first Committee of Management, the members of the Committee of Ways and Means who had erected it. The first A.G.M., the original Committee still in office, was held on the 10th August 1929.

At the last A.G.M. held on January 1979, before the Hall was reopened, the following were re-elected to serve on the "Committee of Management"; Mr Pat MacDonald (Chairman), Mr J. E. Grant of Glenmoriston, Mr Ian Grant, the Rev. P. Fraser and Mr Gordon Cowie (all Trustees) and Messers. A. Nairn, J. Service, P. Stoddart, Mrs M. Fraser and Mrs A. Douglas (Secretary).

The following extracts from "The Inverness Courier" of October 1928 will be of interest. The first is an advertisement from the issue of October 2nd 1928.

"Opening of Glenmoriston Hall By Sir Alexander Grant, Bart on Friday 5th October 1928.

Grand Subscription Dance at 8.30 o'clock Music by Mrs Logan's Orchestra.

Provided a sufficient number of tickets are purchased a Charabanc will leave the Station Square, Inverness, in connection with the above".

Now extracts from the issue of October 9th 1928.

"Friday (5th October) was a memorable day in Glenmoriston, when a large commodious public hall, erected on a convenient site, was opened in presence of a large gathering. The opening ceremony was to have been performed by Sir Alexander Grant, Edinburgh, whose forebears came from the district, but owing to his catching a chill, Sir Alexander, to his great regret, was unable to be present at the opening ceremony, which took place at 8.30pm. His place was taken by the Laird of Glenmoriston. Sir Alexander had spoken with enthusiasm of the Glenmoriston whence his forebears had come and he wished every prosperity to the Glen. Mr Alexander MacDonald, Woodpark, the oldest tenant on the estate thanked the Laird for his part in bringing about the erection of the Hall and declaring it open. Mr A.D. Grant, Factor, (Secretary of the Hall Committee) said he believed that behind the minds of all who had subscribed was the idea that they really wanted to leave the Glen better than they had found it. The ceremony was followed by an enjoyable dance to the tuneful music of Mrs David Logan's Orchestra. Pipe-Major Young of the Cameron Highlanders also played stirring music. There were almost 200 couples present and they all enjoyed themselves. The duties of Master of Ceremonies were courteously carried out by Mr Donald MacDonald (The Pier).

Glenmoriston Village Hall 1979

The following is the report, which appeared in issue number 12 of the magazine in April 1979, on the re-opening of the hall, after it had been closed for months during extensive refurbishment.

" On the 31st March 1979 the now renovated and extended Glenmoriston Village Hall was officially opened. To mark this significant event in the social and communal life of the people a ceilidh was held in the hall in the evening.

A ceilidh, as the genially informative Fear-an-tighe, Rev. Peter Fraser, explained, is a flexible and endlessly adaptable medium for entertainment, particularly appropriate, as became apparent as the evening passed, for the geographical position of the Glen and it's historical and social texture, for it's natural friendliness of it's people (there was an excellent turnout of about 150) and the nature of the entertainment prepared.

The first part of the program comprised a selection of formal assorted concert items interspersed with general dancing. Mr and Mrs Robert Wilson, Kirkhill provided music on accordion and organ respectively and the proceedings began with them playing a medley for an old-fashioned waltz. Then a contingent from Invermoriston School, under the tutelage of the efficient Mrs Nicholson, sang a traditional Gaelic song. This was followed by performances of "The Highland Fling" and "Sword Dance" from Marlene Grant, Alison Taylor and Norma Hossack. Public dancing from the era of ballroom dancing followed, and then Judith Watson and Amanda Grange gave a rendering of "There's a Hole in my Bucket", that showed both verve and polish. Then came Lorraine Service, Paul Tomlin, Shaun Grange and Willie Thompson with their "The Three Craws" supported by their fellow group members in the choir. Now Mrs Nicholson's schoolchildren demonstrated the Scottish Country Dance, "The De'il Amang the Tailors"

Public dancing again and then "The Postie's Dilemma", a play in which Lorraine Service, Charlie Thompson, Christine, Shona Robertson, Willie Thompson, Neil Robertson and Catherine Smart gave spirited performances. A general dance brought this part of the programme to an end. However Alison Taylor and Norma Hossack's "Cakewalk" which should have been performed before the play, was put on at the very end of the evening. A ceilidh is indeed adaptable.

The second part of the evening's programme was a "This is your Life" of Glenmoriston Village Hall. Unfortuately, we have not sufficient space in this issue to do justice to this feature; moreover, with so much space already being devoted to the building of the Hall, one particular facet, it would be over-represented. Therefore, an account of this part of the ceilidh will appear in the next issue of "Moriston Matters".

Meantime, a warm tribute was paid to all who appeared in this project and particularly to Mr Hamish MacDonald who presented the programme with a happy balance between efficiency and a human touch.

A final note: the organisers are grateful for the appreciation expressed by the person who was not present and asked, "Is it only on for one night?", but the feeling of one of them heard to answer, "Thankfully, yes!", is understandable ".

I wonder if the Ceilidh to be held when our new Hall is opened in November 1998 will bear any resemblance to it's predecesor, nearly twenty years ago.



Glenmoriston Millennium Hall

Hoping to catch the Glen before it plunges into the tourist season, we have been encouraging people to think about activities they'd like to see up and running in the new hall when it opens in November. Just over a quarter of households returned slips put out in January and enthusiasm was shown for most clubs suggested, plus a few extra that we hadn't thought of, notably Photography, Gardening, Music-making, Philosophy and International Cuisine. All five of these groups have people prepared to co-ordinate/lead them and the Photography one is already organised and ready to roll.

Scottish dancing was the interest of those present at the Dance meeting and this is now organised. Line Dancing was also mentioned on the returned forms and it is anticipated that this will also take place but organised by those interested directly through the outside teacher.

Those interested in walking will be glad to know that the groups inaugral walk is planned for April 26th. This will be a gentle introduction and anyone is welcome to join in (for information, phone Peter Giddy on 340265).



People will be invited to meetings in the next month at which it is hoped steering groups will be formed for the following activities: Keep Fit and Yoga (meeting on 22/4/98 at the Chalet Park), Film Club, Drama Club and Youth Group. We want to stress that everyone is welcome but we can only contact personally those we know about. If anyone forgot to return their slip or wants to change their mind about being involved in a start-up meeting, we shall be delighted to see them or hear from them. The names and numbers to contact for the moment are repeated at the end of this note. A Hall Newsletter will be out shortly in which we hope to give more precise details.

Glenmoriston Walking Group

This is a newly formed group originating from the Village Hall Committee; we had our inaugural meeting on the 31st March.

During the last week of term pupils had a "Healthy Week" during which they had to concoct some healthy recipies, eat healthy breakfasts, do first aid, go for walks, runs and do aerobics. The following hopefully will keep you fit and healthy too!!

Starter - "SPICIN' IT HOT"

4 Tortilla Chips 1 Leaf of both Lettuce & Mint 1 Tomato and 1/3 of a celery stick

Set the vegetables in the middle of the plate. Set the leaf on the pile. Put the tortilla chips round the edge in a windmill shape then drizzle it with a spicy mexican sauce.

Main Meal - "SEAFOOD PLATTER"

Baguette Prawns and Cocktail Sauce Cheese (Mature Cheddar) Sliced Lemon & Parsley



- 5) Then take the person straight to the doctor to get it checked over professionally.




- Sit up the person so they are very straight.
