#### Glenmoriston Millennium Hall

In the last edition of the magazine, optimism about the new Hall was high: tender documents were out and we expected a contract to be awarded shortly, followed by immediate work on site. Nearly three months on we find ourselves back in very much the same situation we were in then but having weathered a great deal of hassle, heartache and hard work and with less optimism that all will be plain sailing.

How has this come about ? Firstly, when tenders were opened, the lowest of seven was £307,000, more than 50% above cost estimates. Since the MAXIMUM we can have available for everything is £246,000, this was a devastating blow.

Secondly, we realised that percolation tests for the proposed

soakaway under the car park had not been carried out and the area was found to be unsuitable. Thirdly, Protective Services, (who had approached us a year ago with the request that public toilets be incorporated within the fabric of the Hall, to the financial advantage of both Glenmoriston Hall funds and the public purse), made it known that they were having difficulty in getting a definite sum earmarked for that purpose and that, in any event, it would be less than originally anticipated. Hopefully all these matters have been resolved, at least partially.

Without impairing the size or functioning of the Hall, we have identified ways in which specifications could be reduced. Tenders have gone out again with a revised bill of quantities and to six new contractors, in addition to any of the original who wished to retender. We keep our fingers crossed until the 27th July. An acceptable site for a soakaway has been identified behind the new building but this will necessitate the inclusion of a pumping station. In case anyone is wondering why an existing soakaway from the old Hall or public toilets is not being used, the answer is that none ever existed!

On July 6th, Protective Services were able to confirm that £18,300 is now available for public toilets within the Hall. This must be excellent news for Invermoriston, as we now know we will not be among those communities which are to loose these facilities but it still presents us with a funding headache. Because this figure is £8,000 less than estimated when the Millennium grant application was submitted, and that grant will not fund more than 50% of the total project, we are now in danger of losing £8,000 from the Millennium grant.

To sum up: the Millennium Commission are supportive and very much want to see this Hall built; all the elements are in place for a successful retender, a start of building by the end of August and a new Hall by the end of February. However, with recent

However, with recent experiences and some problems still to be resolved, the Committee is not feeling euphoric. Some of you may know that the need to go back to the drawing board at a time when we were expecting to sign the building contract has led to the resignation of one member whose input had been of immense significance. If this latest effort is less than successful, is there anyone out there with the energy to carry on ?

## A Trip to Denmark

A group of the ten best fiddlers and three staff from Glenurquhart High School in Drumnadrochit travelled to Denmark in early June as the guests of Falsters Lilleskole near Nykobing (about 90 minutes south of Copenhagen). Katie Common was one of those fiddlers.

The fiddle group were the guests of honour at a huge small-schools music festival in which over 600 students from all over Europe took part in a two-day extravaganza of music. The event was hosted by Falsters Lilleskole (Falsters Little School) as part of their 25th anniversary celebrations of the opening of the school. The musicians from Drum were asked to play and take part in various ways and, in return, the Danes met all the costs and provided them with hospitality, accommodation and a warm welcome. The group, led by Olivia Ross, visiting strings teacher for this area, and Sheila Bruce, music teacher at Drum school, performed for an hour on Tuesday 16th June. Mr Broadley, headmaster of the school, who also went on the trip, ably assisted by all members of the group, attempted to teach 300 Danes the Gay Gordons and even Strip the Willow in the afternoon. A great time was had by all in a hectic and crammed programme of events over the eight

day excursion which included visits to Copenhagen, the Tivoli Gardens and Rock Music concerts.

The visitors were accommodated by Danish families, who had taken part in an exchange with the school back in April, for the first few days and then, over the duration of the festival, sleeping arrangements were by way of a tented village which was desperately trying to stay put in the strong winds! The group from Glenurquhart High School were magnificent ambassadors for the school and were congratulated on their behavior and high quality of their fiddle music. The local Director of Education (Denmark) was so impressed that he has promised to welcome them again in the year 2000, making a Danish exchange a possibility once every two years.

#### Local News

On a sunny Saturday in May (was there one ?) Hugh and Caren Minne, who live at Aultsigh, set out with their spades, intent on doing a cleaning-up job at the ancient site of Saint Columba's well, near the Glenmoriston Stores. At the same time, Mike Alien and I, not wishing to be upstaged by their magnificient efforts, decided to do a bit of "Wombling". # Glenmoriston Village Hall 1979

The second part of the ceilidh held in Glenmoriston Public Hall on the evening of the 31st March 1979 to mark the re-opening of the Hall took the form of a "This is Your Life" of the Hall itself. It was, of course, modelled on the television programme, but only loosely so. However, there was nothing 'loose' about the way in which the presenter of the programme, Mr. Hamish MacDonald, Fort Augustus (but of strong Glenmoriston connection) admirably handled the material, letting history slip back and rolling it forwards again.

The purpose of this programme was, in a modest way, to give some idea of the history of the Hall's half-century or so of existence, featuring, as far as possible, personalities. It was

stressed that of course those who very kindly consented to taking part were representative, for many and various were they who, over the years, played parts in the Hall's continued functioning as a focal point in the community.

In calling forwards Pat MacDonald, The Pier, Jimmy MacEwan, Inverness, formerly of Port Clair and The Pier, and Stanley Grant, Inverness and once of Craigian, Hamish MacDonald explained the link between past and present, for they are the sons of three of the Hall's founder-members, Donald MacDonald (Danny the Pier), Jimmy MacEwan, Forester and A.D. Grant, Factor, respectively. These three imparted their own interesting and diverting memories of different aspects of Hall life.

Since the Hall began it's life, Mr. MacDonald went on, it had been famed for it's cheerfulness and hospitality; and to represent all those who had provided this last, the many "tea ladies", he called on Kate Stoddart, Riverside Park, who, as she was escorted towards the stage, was heard to say protestingly that she had to 'see to the tea' for this very evening. But forwards she came, and explained how these early tea ladies had to be literally "drawers of water", for they had to go to St. Columba's Well for it.

Mrs Mary Kennedy, Kiltarlity, the Rev. Peter Fraser's sister, was asked by Hamish to be the next representative. Those whom she represented were, and continue to be, an essential part of Glenmoriston community life, the persons who come into the place and who, if they do not stay, yet sojourn to contribute a great deal. Mary Kennedy was sure, she revealed, that she must have attended the opening dance in the Hall back in 1928, for then she had been helping Mrs MacDonald, The Pier, (at a time when Pat was "then a good little boy). And she recounted how Ronnie would give her 2/- to go to a dance (it was 2/- then for ladies and 2/6 for men!) and how Danny, who was "on the door" would wave her in. So she had her 2/- and her dance.

But the Hall was not, of course, used for dances alone. As the years rolled on various activities were catered for. In 1931, a Glenmoriston Social Club was formed. It had to provide its own coal and paraffin. In that year too the Fort Augustus Branch of the Bank of Scotland started using the Hall for the convenience of its customers, and the W.R.I, was formed. In 1934, the Women's Guild began to make use of the Hall, and the Roman Catholic Church introduced worship. A choral class was meeting once a week in 1937... At this point Mr MacDonald interrupted his narrative to convey the good wishes to the Hall and all concerned of Mr Jack MacKenzie and to hand over a personal message from him to Pat the Pier. Jack MacKenzie, now in Liberton Hospital, Edinburgh, is the son of a former headmistress of Invermoriston School, a previous Headmaster of which, Mr Pollock had been one

of the Hall's founding members.

Then, the narrative being resumed, came the outbreak of World War 2, and the Hall was in action in another way. From 1940 onwards it was used by the Home Guard and the Barrier Guard as a base for excercises. Then there broke out the "great fire" that ravaged the plantations of Sron-na-Muic - and there came a "voice" from the past.

This was the recorded voice of the Rev. Duncan M. Turner, the Rev. Peter Fraser's predecessor. Mr Turner on being contacted was delighted to renew his association with the Glen by sending a taped message, which, in a highly entertaining and instructive way, dwelt mainly on the part played in fighting the forest fire. A dance, Petronella, brought this first part of the programme to an end.

An account of the second half of the "This is your Life" of the Hall will appear in the next edition of "Moriston Matters".

The following extract appeared in the February 1978 edition (No.5) of the magazine.

"The dance held in Glenmoriston Hall on Friday 20th January 1978, in aid of our Hall funds realised £13.00. Dances in Invermoriston usually swing along to a pleasant tune, but alas this was not the case and it ended up with about £12.00 worth of damage being done. All dance notices will now be billed with RIGHT OF ADMISSION RESERVED".

Another, and this time slightly more successful, fundraising event was held on Saturday 23rd September 1978.
