Situations vacant

Due to events in my private life over the last few months I feel I no longer have the heart to continue to produce "Moriston Matters". As you can well imagine the job requires time, dedication and considerable effort, none of which I can provide any more - if I do something I like to give it 100% - therefore the post of Editor is now vacant.

In June 1977, the first issue of "Glenmoriston News & Views" (which was subsequently to become "Moriston Matters") was produced. It was begun in response to the official suggestion that villages should mark the Queen's Silver Jubilee by some effort that would be of benefit to the Community. At that time, a number of incomer families, some of them refurbishing old croft houses, were settling in Glenmoriston, and to help the population (just on 300) integrate a community magazine was launched. 31 editions were published, the last one being in February 1983. In those days the magazine was bi-monthly but, eight years later in February 1991 when I resurected it, publication was cut to four

editions per annum. Now, 34 editions later, I have come to the end of the road.

I am indebited to David and Sylvia Andrews for their help, support and encouragement over the past eight years. Not only did they provide the resources for the production of the magazine i.e. computers, photocopiers, paper etc but also a proof-reading service, a collating, folding and stapelling service and a tossing around ideas service - all invaluable tools for a busy newspaper editor!

I would also like to thank all past contributers and to apologise if I harrassed you for material. After all I was only doing my job! My thanks also to those business outlets who tirelessly sold copies in their premises.

I hope somebody somewhere feels the same as I used to about the magazine in that it would be a great shame for it to slide into oblivion once more. After all we have so much to write about now with the new hall.

If anyone feels they would like to take on this unpaid labour of love then please do get in touch. I will try to give as much help as I can. There is a possiblity that the photocopier belonging to the hall would be available for production so the job requirements would simply be access to a word processor, some spare time and an interest in the happenings of the Glen, historically and up-to-date.

Glenmoriston Indoor Bowling Club

In the Spring of 1998 a steering committee was formed from a group of people interested in having an indoor bowling club in the new hall. At that time an application for a grant of money to the T.S.B. for buying new equipment for the club had been made by the Millenium Hall Committee and, if partly or wholly successful, could mean indoor bowling for the people of the Glen next season. The first five members of the steering committee i.e. Alan & Fran Middleton, Isabel Anthony, Matthew Douglas and Brian Furie - decided to go ahead and do what had to be done in the hope that indoor bowling would be a reality. But at that time, the new hall was hoped to be completed by late November.

After various meetings over the ensuing months, much had been accomplished. We had a constitution in the name of the Glenmoriston Indoor Bowling Club. We became an affiliated member of the Sports Council and our treasurer, Isobel, had opened a Girobank account in the club's name.

From dialogue with other bowling clubs, we acquired copies of the rules of play. An enrolment fee of £ 5 per member was agreed with an annual subscription of £10.

In early Autumn we learned to our delight that the application for a grant from the T.S.B. had been awarded in full. From that grant we were able to order:

2 carpets 40ft x 9ft; 2 pairs of mats; 2 jacks and 5 sets of bowls. The club was now a reality and no longer a possibility! We booked 2 sessions weekly for when the new hall opened in April, both for Monday - an afternoon session from 2-4 pm and an evening session from 7-10pm.

To date, 29 people have expressed a desire to join and many of these have already enrolled. With two carpets, numbers unfortunately will have to be restricted at the beginning until we see how many wish to play in the afternoon and/or evening. Eight people can play (2 teams of 4) on each carpet for 1 set of 10 games (known as "ends"). Therefore a maximum of 16 people can play on both carpets at the one time. 16 other people can then

play on both carpets in the 2nd half of the session. Therefore 32 people is the maximum number per session. As we have yet to discover how many wish to play in the afternoons and/or evening sessions, we have decided, at present, to restrict the numbers of members to 40. But this number could be increased if the enthusiasm of members led to their desiring a 3rd session per week. Also it is hoped that by the end of the year, we may be able to buy a 3rd carpet from membership fees, fund raising and/or a successful application to the Sports Council. To this end the present committee has called for an AGM for Monday 26th April at 7pm so that members can express their opinions and views on the future running of their club. Some may wish to continue playing through the summer, possibly one session per week. Other indoor clubs have now finished this present season and closed this past week. If it's feasible we may continue through the summer. But only the members can decide and arrange these future activities. A new committee will be formed on the 26th to represent the views of the members. As the club is run for the members by the members, we are hoping for a big turnout so that the views can be expressed and acted upon. The first meeting of the club is on Monday 19th April. Each session costs £1 - where else could you get several hours of enjoyment for a pound ? - and that includes tea/coffee and biscuits !!

Last week 14 members from our Glen accepted an invitation to go along for a friendly match with the members of Drumnadrochit Indoor Bowling Club. As they knew many of us had never bowled a bowl before, it was to be an evening of instruction as well as the practical skills of playing. The advice cheerfully and kindly given to those of us who had never played before was received in kind by us. We were also the recipients of more hospitality by the lavish refreshments laid on for us by the club. We all had a great evening out and are now hoping to return the hospitality next season when we will host the next freindly match. Here's hoping that indoor bowling will be a feature in the area for years to come in our magnificent new hall !!

Glenmoriston Millennium Hall

Friday 16th April was a very special day in Glenmoriston's 1999 calendar. The glenmoriston Millennium Hall was finally opened after many months of waiting and many years of tireless fundraising.

Approximately 175 people flooded through the doors to get a view of what will hopefully become the heart and soul of the village. There were some very special guests present which included Mrs Ford who had attended the 1st opening of the old hall back in 1928 and Rebecca MacDonald who should have present on that occasion back in 1928 but was indisposed.

The lads and lasses from the 237 Field Squadron T.A. Royal Engineers from RAF Lossiemouth who played a major role in the creation of the hall by constructing the car park, a prerequisite to getting the hall in the first place, came back to help celebrate it's opening.

Jennifer Isles from the Millennium Commission in London who has been involved from the very start was there along with John Farquhar Munroe, and Charles Kennedy MP who performed the actual

opening ceremony and was presented with a beautiful tartan clock from Graineag Crafts, Glenmoriston, as a special reminder of the occasion.

The music was supplied by "Hurley Burley", one of whose members, Shona Robertson, has very definite connections with the Glen. Other entertainment was provided by Eilidh Davis from Invergarry on the clarsach, Katie & Vickie Common, Amy Bisset and Cassie McEwan on their fiddles, Alistair Levings on the piano and a special mention must go to young Stewart Atkins who bravely danced his fling and swords amongst an audience milling about on the floor, many of whom, rather rudely, didn't even notice he was there. Well done Stewart!

A big thank you must surely go to all those ladies (and gents) who provided the sumptuous buffet, the table was literally groaning with food from sandwiches to quiches, dips and things to Millenium cake (specially baked by Ann Douglas) and much more. Everybody was treated to a complementary glass of fizz with which to drink the continued good health of the hall and all who sail in her ! (a few were sailing by the end of the evening !) Pat MacDonald unveiled a plaque commemorating the opening which will be on permanent display in the hall and also ceremoniously cut the cake. Raffles were drawn, lucky number programs were drawn and the guests danced till the early hours. Saturday afternoon belonged to the newly formed clubs; each one proudly presenting what they had to offer in the way of sport, rest and/or relaxation. The evening was turned over to the younger members of the community with a disco for all ages. Unfortunately another similar function was being held in Drum the same night so that kept the numbers down. However a good time was had by all.

On Sunday an inter-denominational church service of dedication was held by the Episcopalian minister from Foyers. Around forty people went along with Father Francis Davidson from Fort Augustus in attendance too.

The First Thirteen Miles

On the 13th March 1999, I, along with four thousand, four hundred and forty five others (joggers, runners, athletes, loonies, basket-cases, people who have absolutely nothing better to do on a Sunday morning) lined up at the start of the 17th running of the Reading Half Marathon. It was a glorious sunny day with a slight breeze which kept it from being too hot. The 13.2 mile route was lined with spectators clapping and cheering every runner along; bands played, children clattered pots and pans with wooden spoons (and anything else they could get their hands on); volunteers dished out thousands of paper cups filled with sap-replenishing water. 
are too poor to buy them. Houses in China are usually made out of mud, bricks or wood but mainly bricks or mud because wood is scarce in cities.
